Over the next five years, based around the new court complex at Salisbury Square, the main artery of the ward will be one of the City of London's Key Areas of Change, as designated in the City Plan 2040. A critical role of your team of Ward Councillors is to ensure this will bring benefits to all – to residents (existing and future), businesses and visitors alike – whilst mitigating the social and environmental impact of this unprecedented scale of local development. Over the past 3 years, your Ward Councillors have been instrumental in:

- Securing developer contributions through the planning system for public realm enhancements, including £9m from the Community Infrastructure Levy over the next 5 years to part fund delivery of FSQ's public realm strategy.
- Preserving the famous Tipperary Pub, a favourite watering hole of Fleet Street's journalists and printers, which will soon be re-opening for new business customers, students and local residents.
- Ensuring the health and safety of the Street, monitoring its air quality, protecting pedestrian access and crossings (see edition 88), and clamping down on irresponsible cyclists.
- Enhancing street cleansing and local refuse collections in collaboration with the Fleet Street Quarter BID.
- Connecting developers like Mace, Dominus, LandSec and their contractors
  with local training facilities, including the Green Skills Hub (The Fleot) in New
  Bridge Street to offer work experience, apprenticeships and jobs across all
  stages of construction.
- Fleet Street area: securing developer provision of a new exhibition space for the St Bride Foundation (to be part of 65 Fleet Street), and a great new home for Shoe Lane Library when Hill House is redeveloped. Completion dates for other developments: Daily Telegraph Building (with Daniel House) late 2025 | Salisbury Square (new law courts) 2026 | 65 Fleet Street 2027 | | 8-12 New Bridge Street late 2027.

Finally, regarding **120 Fleet Street (former site of Boots)** the developer is looking for an anchor tenant before commencing the next phases, and we are persistently pushing the planners to apply pressure to get this moving.

### Thames Tideway tunnel Blackfriars foreshore | Nearing completion

We're pleased to report significant progress in the work on the new Thames Tideway tunnel, illustrated during recent heavy rainfall in London, when 850,000 tonnes of sewage, which would have been diverted into the Thames, was captured by the super sewer in a single 24-hour period. 12 out of 21 sewer connection points are now live.

Full operation is on track for completion later this year. Construction of the Tunnel began in 2016, and the first sewage flowed into the tunnel last September. The total cost of the project is circa £5bn.

A key benefit from the project is the new Blackfriars public realm – *see photo* – which at long last is taking shape.

At 110 metres long it is the largest single structure built into the River Thames in 150 years. When the site opens later this summer, it will create a wonderful new amenity for Castle Baynard residents, workers and visitors to enjoy. The new flexible space will offer numerous possibilities for activities including relaxation, sports, play and popup events.

We look forward to working with local stakeholders and City officers to maximise the benefits of this exciting new amenity.



#### **Clean City Awards Scheme 2025**

Businesses of all sectors and sizes across the Square Mile are invited to enter London's top environmental awards scheme. Organised by the City of London Corporation, the Clean City Awards recognise and celebrate firms that go above and beyond to make the Square Mile even cleaner and more sustainable. This year's awards will be presented by Mary Durcan JP, local Castle Baynard Councillor and Chair of the Corporation's Port and Environmental Services Committee, at the Mansion House on Thursday 13 February.

### Companies can apply for awards in various categories, including:

- Working towards better Air Quality and Climate Action
- Promoting better management of resources and the "circular economy" by encouraging businesses to 'Reduce, Reuse and Recycle'.
- Moving towards a plastic-free City by reducing reliance on single use plastics.

The scheme encourages City businesses to improve their sustainable practices as well as providing a forum to exchange initiatives both within the City and beyond.
